He was also active in other QC organizations, e.g. EOQC. He served as its president for the term 1967/68. He was granted Emeritus status in 1985. We all will remember Olle for his dedication to our good cause, his open mind and his cheerful personality.

May he rest in peace!

IAQ Office moves

The Board has decided to give the green light to our Executive's proposal to transfer the IAQ office from Berne to Frankfurt. There is one main reason to do so. Our office in Berne, ATAG, able as it was to keep flawlessly our bank accounts and financial records, was never willing to act as secretariat in the proper sense of the term. But we must and do step up our activities. It is virtually impossible to keep up our present division of tasks among our officers under the constraints of today. The Secretary-General is overtaxed, if he has to handle all business correspondence including invoices, memos etc. without the proper infrastructure in his office.

IAQ Office moves (Ct'd)

Our new caretaker is the headquarter of the German Society for Quality (DGQ). It offers on a professional basis all the services we need. Acn $\underline{\text{Hansen}}$ is its president, our president, Acn $\underline{\text{Zeller}}$ a member of its board, and Acn $\underline{\text{Masing}}$ its Honorary president. Therefore, we are sure to get even a little more than what we pay for. After all, DGQ has paid for printing and postage of CONTACT from its first issue till today.

This move will also eliminate once and for all the fiscal problems which up to now have been threatening our finances (and officers!). Being incorporated as a "Registered Society" according to German law, tax-exemption is a fact. IAQ may then publish books, accept donations, handle projects where money is involved; all this was dangerous for the officers in the past, because the legal status of IAQ was never totally clear as far as the internal revenue office was concerned. So the officers could be held personally responsible.

Project 3 (Education in Quality) revitalized

The matter is patched on the present course curricula...A change in the universities' culture, planned and led by the Board of Directors, is necessary" He goes on to say:

I think that it's an urgent task for the IAQ to prepare a recommendation for the university top management in order to plan and to accomplish a complete transformation of the teaching style by the QC philosophy.

I bring this to attention of the entire Academy, because this is a matter which needs the combined effort of all of us. After all: It takes some doing to teach an elephant to dance. In any case, Acn Gogue will be happy to receive whatever help he can get from you.

IAQ Annual Meeting in Moscow 1988/06/13

This year the Academy met in connection with the 32nd EOQC congress. 25 members attended the meeting which was chaired by Acn Feigenbaum, chairman of the Board. Formal proceedings will be sent to all Academicians. Important decisions were taken. The following short summary was prepared by Acn Zeller, president.

"...The organizers had prepared an excellent venue in the International Trade Center...Chairman Feigenbaum welcomed all participants. Then president Zeller welcomed Mr $\underline{\text{Fuchs}}$ (AT&T) as a new member and presented his diploma to him. He also welcomed Acn $\underline{\text{Mattana}}$ who attended an IAQ meeting for the first time (The curriculum appeared in CONTACT Nr. 28).

Among the items discussed was the new IAQ-Yearbook, well accepted by all, as a new milestone in the history of IAQ. The next edition will follow in February 1989; preparations are well under way.

The president explained the necessity to move the IAQ Administrative Office to Frankfurt. As both the Executive and the Board had examined the move very thoroughly and recommended it, the vote was unanimous in favour. It was the common feeling that this would improve the activities of IAQ, as the present facilities were no longer adequate for our increasing business.

IAQ Annual Meeting in Moscow, cont'd

To absorb the rising costs of all these activities, the chairman explained and supported the proposal of the Executive to increase the annual fee to \$ 120.00, beginning with our fiscal year 1989. Nobody disagreed.

Acn <u>Harrington</u>, vice-president, then gave a lively report of the state of all <u>IAQ</u> projects, finalized, actual and proposed. Some of them were discussed in detail.

Another discussion centered on a special award to be established by IAQ. Acn $\underline{\text{Knowles}}$ had already designed a procedure for this complete with cost estimation. The assembly was unanimously in favour of such an award and the Executive was charged with implementing it.

The meeting was closed by the president late in the afternoon. He thanked the Academicians for their most valuable contributions. Before the adjournment | Acn Musi invited everybody to attend the forthcoming International Conference on QC to be held in Buenos Aires and Rio de Janeiro October 23 to 27, 1989 (see following item).

Our next Annual Meeting

Mention was made in the last issue of CONTACT of the decision to support officially the forthcoming South American Conference on Quality, scheduled for October 23 to 27, 1989 in Buenos Aires and Rio de Janeiro. In the meantime another decision has been taken to hold the Annual Meeting of IAQ in connection with that event. This makes it even more important for all of us to prepare for a trip to South America next fall.

The following is an excerpt from the First Anouncement:

The General Theme is "Quality, the Language for the Future". Papers relating to virtually all aspects of quality and quality control are welcome. Abstracts in English, 250 words, should be submitted to reach the Secretariat either in Argentina or Brazil not later than October 31, 1988. A short biographical sketch and a portrait photo (50x50 mm) of the author should be attached. The authors will be advised by January 30, 1989, concerning acceptance of their papers. Final papers, typed in English on format paper provided by the Secretariat should be submitted by June 30, 1989. The working languages of the conference will be English, Portugese and Spanish with simultaneous interpretation. The authors should indicate where they wish to present their papers, either in Buenos Aires or Rio de Janeiro, since the program will not be the same in both cities.

Project Work revitalized

From the last issue of CONTACT you know already that Acns <u>Harrington</u> and <u>Hurd</u> had formed a new company. While it would have been perfectly understandable that both our highly esteemed colleagues now concentrate on their new chores to such an extent that IAQ would play second fiddle, I was confident enough to write "from what we see so far we need not worry". Indeed, we don't. Jim, in his capacity of vice-president, has really begun to revitalize our project business. A new format has been created which was already used in Moscow for his presentation (see this issue's item 2). No less than 12 new potential areas of project work were suggested. Our constitution stipulates that every Academician should participate in active projects; however there are exemptions, now established as follows:

- 1. President or Chairman of the Board (not receiving a salary) of a recognized international or national non-profit organization concerned whith Q-tasks
- 2. Officer or member of the Board of IAQ
- 3. Editor of IAQ CONTACT, Yearbook or IRIS (themselves projects of IAQ)
- 4. Conducting significant activities to further the concepts and principles of quality under the IAQ umbrella
- 5. Written exemption by the president of IAQ
- 6. Emeritus or Honorary member of IAQ

Good work, Jim! Keep on like that and we'll soon see results. We now have an important outlet for the results, the IAQ Yearbook, hungry for worth-while copy.

This gives me the welcome opportunity to bring to your attention a most unusual honour, lately bestowed on our vice-president: He has been nominated "Official Adviser" to the China QC Association of the China State Economic Commission. Being by now an old China hand myself with 5 month' of teaching there (well: General Management, but what's this without a hefty chunk of Quality Management?) I can perhaps appreciate that honour better than many of our colleagues, not, of course, Acns Aune, Ishikawa, Hansen, Kondo or Sandholm, who are well acquainted from own experiences with the problems of that vast and interesting country.

ITC-Publications on Quality
