
The debate will be structured as follows: I will ask three Academicians (one from each geographic area) to give his/her personal opinion about a common question that will be submitted to them in advance.







IAQ Chairman Yoshio Kondo

The ASQ's *Edwards Medal for 1997* was awarded to Acn. Spencer Hutchens, Jr., "for his significant and extensive contributions to quality management as evidenced by the superior manner in which he has demonstrated leadership in government and industry; and for his promotion of quality throughout the world." Spencer is President of Intertek Technical Services.

The Edwards Medal is presented to the individual who has demonstrated the most outstanding leadership in the application of modern quality control methods, especially through the organization and administration of such work.

The ASQ's Lancaster Award for 1997 was awarded to Acn. Yoshio Kondo "for his outstanding contribution and exceptionally devoted leadership in the global quality movement aiming at happiness of people, international cooperation, and friendship; for numerous superior publications; and for championing skills and abilities as a recognizable educator worldwide. Yoshio is Professor Emeritus at Kyoto University.

The Lancaster Award is presented in recognition of dedication and outstanding contributions to the international community of quality professionals.

IAQ MEETS AT THE ASQ CONGRESS IN PHILADELPHIA

Seventeen Academicians attended part or all of the IAQ General Meeting held Tuesday, May 5, 1998 at the American Society for Quality Annual Quality Congress Philadelphia. in Academicians attending the IAO meeting were: President Marcos Bertin, Yossi Bester, Ken Case, Ed Fuchs, Blan Godfrey, Bill Golomski, Spencer Hutchens, Jim Harrington, John Hromi, Gopal Kanji, Chairman




Yoshio Kondo, Dave Luther, Enrique Sierra, Madhav Sinha, Ken Stephens, Greg Watson, Agnes Žaludovà. Acn. Way Kuo attended the ASQ Congress but other commitments prevented him from attending the IAQ meeting.

Some notes (NOT the official minutes) from the meeting included the following:

- Chairman Yoshio Kondo and President Marcos Bertin opened the meeting.
- President Bertin discussed the IAQ financial status. He reported that as an outcome of the successful IAQ seminar in Yokohama, we enjoy a surplus in our account. While this is good, we must manage our finances to avoid the risk of having too much surplus in the eyes of the German tax authorities.
- Copies of *The Best on Quality* are approved for donation to the EFQM and the Argentine Society for Quality. **John Hromi** is responsible for the list of quality organizations that deserve to receive book donations.
- President Bertin discussed factors for consideration in the possible relocation of our Administrative Office. These factors include: (1) The desire of the German administrative group to concentrate on their own objectives, (2) the significant annual charge for administrative activities, (3) lack of ability to pay through credit cards, (4) local tax regulations, and (5) no web site. A team headed by Past Chairman Val Feigenbaum, and including Past Chairman Jim Harrington, Dave Luther, and Gregory Watson, will meet with representatives of the ASQ to discuss the possibility of relocating the IAQ Administrative Office to the ASQ Headquarters. This group will report at the IAQ Board Meeting in Paris in October 1998.
- Acn. Bill Golomski discussed the status of revisions to the Constitution and Rules of Procedure. Bill will update the Constitution and forward it to Chairman Kondo and President Bertin for review. After that, it will be brought before the Board and then to the entire membership for final voting.
- Letters of invitation are being sent to new Academicians Thong Ngee Goh of Singapore, and Andries de Wet of South Africa. Others under evaluation as Academician or Associate Member were mentioned. The Associate Member status is temporarily held up pending Constitution changes.
- Academicians who will now become Corresponding Members include the following: Enrique Jorge Garcia, John A. Goldsmith, and Richard J. Schlesinger.

IAQ MEETS AT THE ASQ CONGRESS IN PHILADELPHIA, CONTINUED



- Academicians who have attained Academician Emeritus status include the following: Murray E. Liebman, Enrique Blanco Loizelier, and Dorian Shainin.
- Acn. Ed Fuchs filled in for Acn. Tito Conti in a detailed review of the status of all projects. That report is presented in detail on page 5 of this newsletter.
- Acn. Madhav Sinha proudly delivered Volume 9 of *The Best On Quality* at the meeting. (Editor's Note: Thanks for the signed complimentary copy, Madhav.) Now, emphasis turns to Volume 10. See the Call for Papers on page 4.
- Acn. Yossi Bester reviewed his listing of "Three Years' Major International Quality Conferences" and received inputs from the attendees. This listing is very helpful to Academicians and presents a clearer view of which Academicians are participating in various conferences throughout the world. Yossi then discussed the First IAQ Executive Symposium and the difficulties faced in organizing such a session. There was also discussion of IAQ member participation and involvement. (Editor's Note: Along in here, the discussion started that led to Acn. Ed Fuchs' assignment to provoke discussion via e-mail and the Internet. See the separate document entitled "SELF-ASSESSMENT: A Compilation of Comments" sent with this newsletter.)
- Chairman Yoshio Kondo reported on activities regarding the Asian Team. He has contacted 17
 potential team members and most have been able to accept his invitation. The proposed project of
 the Asian Team is "Quality in Developing Countries."
- Past Chairman Jim Harrington reported on progress for the project "Vision 2000." There is an initiative to publish a special edition of TQM Magazine as a joint task with the IAQ toward the year 2000. Another initiative is a joint quality seminar involving the IAQ, ASQ, and APQO (Asia Pacific Quality Organization). The seminar is scheduled for Hawaii in March 2000.
- Acn. Ken Case reported on the status of Contact and the high degree of cooperation among Academicians in submitting materials for the newsletter. Ken also noted the need to identify the next Editor of Contact. Ken's commitment as Editor was for a period of two years (eight issues), ending with the June 1998 issue, Volume 71. The timing on this commitment was quite lucky, since Ken has recently been asked to add to his current responsibilities at Oklahoma State University by becoming Director of the new Master of Science in Engineering and Technology Management program.
- Acn. Gopal Kanji presented his very interesting introductory speech on "Project Partnering, Supply Chain Management, and TQM: Discussed and Illustrated with respect to Construction."
- The next IAQ meeting will be held on Friday, October 23, 1998 during the EOQ/EFQM Conference in Paris.
- The meeting was closed.

With the forthcoming revisions to the ISO 9000 series, this issue of *The Best On Quality* may be a good forum to voice opinions, pro and con, with possible influence on the system that evolves, as well as expressing concerns and information to management considering their quality systems. New opinions, observations, convictions, information, etc., on the subject are welcome, including insights to possible revisions of ISO 9001 / 9004, etc. Please follow these guidelines:

- Submit two (2) copies and a disk of the paper. The manuscript should be double-spaced, with 1" margin, on letter size paper, printed on one side only. The name and format of the software used must be indicated on the diskette, for text and figures. The preferred format is MS Word (6.0/95 or lower) or WordPerfect (6.1 or lower); later versions of both allow you to "save as" in these formats.
- Title. Keep the title length to ten words long, or fewer.
- Abstract. Provide a 150-word Abstract of main points, results, conclusions, and their significance.
- Text. The body of the paper should be about 25-30 pages long, not more, including figures and diagrams. Begin with an Introduction explaining the significance of the work discussed. Break the text into headings and subheadings. Use terminology that is widely understandable and restrict the use of acronyms and jargon. Introduce essential acronyms in parentheses following terms they abbreviate.
- Reference list. Give numbers to all cited text literature as superscripts pointed at appropriate places in the sentence. Then, list quoted references at the end of the article numerically in the order they are cited. The listing of references must be complete and typed in the same consistent style for all references: Name of author(s), or editor, full title of book or periodical or proceedings, or article, with volume number or title of a series (if it has multi-volume publications), edition (if not original), publisher's name, city of publication, year of publication, and page numbers.
- Permissions. Authors must obtain written permission to reprint borrowed material.
- Tables and Figures. Tables and figures should be used freely wherever possible to summarize lengthy text material. Make sure to label and provide captions for all graphics, tables, and figures.
- Appendix. Technical material or research methodology should be placed in an appendix.
- Deadline for manuscript submission. August 31, 1998 (preferred); October 1, 1998 (latest).

Acn. Ed Fuchs

Acn. Tito Conti was unable to attend the IAQ meeting in Philadelphia on May 5, 1998 to lead the group in a review of the status of the 19 projects currently under way. He asked Acn. Ed Fuchs to step in and oversee the review activity. Ed did a superb job. There were no in-depth updates; rather, the status of projects and their disposition were discussed in both the Board Meeting and the General Meeting. The following write-up comes from Tito Conti, based upon Ed Fuchs' summary.

Acn. **Tito Conti** writes: I will summarize the status of IAQ Projects as reported to me by **Ed Fuchs**, who was so kind to review them on my behalf at the Board meeting in Philadelphia. Following the direction of the Board, Ed also led a project review at the open meeting of Academicians that followed the Board meeting.

- Project 1 Continue.
- Project 2 Acn. Norman Burgess issued the 2nd draft on April 5. A suggestion from Philadelphia was to consider possible merging of this project with Project 8. As a matter of fact, Norman's approach makes it a different subject with respect to Project 8. Therefore it should continue. It could be circulated among Academicians in Paris (or even before, through *Contact*), then published as a final draft by the end of 1998, hoping that in the meantime Academicians provide their comments.
- Projects 3 & 4 Continue these projects with expectations, per Acn. Bill Golomski, of substantive project read-out and results at the 1999 ASQ.
- Project 5 Continue. An interest of May Gatchalian
- Project 6 Continue per the IAQ Board.
- Project 7 Cancel, per Acn. Dave Luther.
- Project 8 Continue.
- Project 9 Retain this project, but postpone any expectations of results until after Acn. Kano completes his current university special assignment, which is dominating his time.
- Project 10 Chairman Kondo will restart this project.
- Project 11 Retain as an active project. Acn. Harrington reports that it is getting started.
- Project 12 Continue.
- Project 15 This project is active, per Acn. A. Blanton Godfrey. There will be a report in October on "what is happening in healthcare quality." However, it remains a one-person project.
- Project 16 Continue.
- Projects 17 & 18 Ask Acns. Brendon and Dale to continue their one-person involvements in each of these projects, with read-outs at appropriate times.
- Project 19 Acn. Agnes Žaludovà received clarification on the history of IAQ awards, the "Scheme" for awards that exists, the problems that were experienced, and based on this information, she will continue for the time being.

IAQ Project No. 8: TQM Models / Business Models for Improvement

Project leader: Acn. Tito Conti. Project team: Acns. Enrique Garcia, Miflora Gatchalian, Jim Harrington, J. Claude Savard

Having reached what the Plan of Project 8 indicates as "Step 2", on January 24, 1998 I sent to my colleagues of Team 8 and to some other Academicians a 9 page document that I had conceived as the "guideline" for model analysis (steps 3 & 4), asking for comments. Comments were received from Ed Fuchs and Dieter Seghezzi. On

April 4, 1998 I repeated my request to those colleagues, whose contribution was, in my opinion, highly desirable. My attempt has been unsuccessful, up to now. Since Steps 3 & 4 cannot be a one-person job, I wish now to ask through Contact who is willing to co-operate. I will be glad to send the document to those Academicians who commit themselves to provide comments on the approach and then share the burden of model analysis. I will continue, even if on a lower scale and at lower speed.

ACNS. BILL GOLOMSKI AND KEN CASE ELECTED TO NAE POSTS



Acn. William A.J. Golomski was elected to the Peer Committee of Section 8 of the National Academy of Engineering. This group has the difficult job of screening potential members in operational systems engineering, industrial engineering, and manufacturing engineering. The nominee-to-selected ratio is approximately 8:1, with nearly all nominees having exceptional records of engineering achievement.

At the same time, Acn. Ken Case was elected to the Committee on Membership of the NAE. This

group reviews and oversees the criteria for member selection. It also reviews and votes on the nominees selected by the Peer Committees. This is the second of three votes taken on each new member. The final voting is by the NAE membership.



IAQ members of NAE include Acns. Ken Case, Val Feigenbaum, and Bill Golomski. There are about 1800 members. The NAE and the National

Academy of Sciences (NAS) advise the federal government on science and technology policy, sponsor programs aimed at national needs, and recognize outstanding engineers and scientists.

RIT / USA TODAY QUALITY AWARD CUP FOR TEAMS; ACN. GOLOMSKI IS JUDGE

Each year the Rochester Institute of Technology (RIT, where Acn. **John Hromi** used to teach) and the *USA TODAY* newspaper (the largest in the USA) sponsor the RIT / USA TODAY Quality Cup Award for teams (not companies). A total of 176 teams applied this year in six categories. The winners were:

- Education University of California, Irvine, a model for sustaining administrative improvement, large-scale parking & transportation.
- Government Tennessee Valley Authority, Allen Fossil Plant, fuel switching to low sulfur coal.
- Health Care Rochester, NY General Hospital, improving cardiac surgery outcomes.
- Manufacturing Allied Signal Aerospace MS&S, improving valve quality in a project that had previously failed eight times.

- Service GE Capital Mortgage Insurance Corporation, developing various options for action after a mortgage failure.
- Small Business Diamond Packaging Services, second shift self managed team of part-time and full-time packing manufacturing employees who saved a line of business from being dropped.

Three corporate CEOs and several other corporate officers attended.

Acn. Bill Golomski has served as a Judge for each of the seven years the award has been in existence. Two full pages of the May 1, 1998 issue of the USA TODAY were devoted to the winners and the nine finalists. There is no lack of interest over time.

DOCTOR'S THESIS ON "POOR QUALITY COSTING"

As Adjunct Professor in Quality Management at the Royal Institute of Technology, Stockholm, Acn. Lennart Sandholm initiated a research work on poor quality costing. This work has now resulted in a doctor's thesis, which was successfully defended by Lennart's student, Lars Sörqvist, on 20 March 98.

Four Academicians were involved in the defense ceremony. Acn Blanton Godfrey contributed immensely as the opponent. His comments on the research work have been of great value. The same goes for the three-man international examination committee: Acn Asbjørn Aune from Norway, Acn Ove Hartz from Denmark and Mr. Jorma Veräjänkorva from Finland (Vice President Quality of Valmet Corporation). The fourth Acn. involved was Acn. Sandholm, as he has been Dr. Sörqvist's instructor. The thesis includes nine chapters:

- Chapter 1, *Introduction*, gives the background, purpose, methodology used, etc. This chapter is available on the Internet (http://www.sandholm.se).
- Chapter 2, Quality, describes what we mean by quality and the main ideas behind modern quality work. This is an important basis for the thesis, as the reader would not be able to determine what poor quality is without having a good understanding of what good quality is. This chapter also explains the author's views and the foundations on which the results of the thesis are based.
- Chapter 3, Poor quality costs, explains how poor quality costs can be defined, what the information can be used for, and how the costs can be classified and grouped. The aim of this chapter is to inform the reader about what we mean by poor quality costs and to define and delimit the basis of the thesis work.
- Chapter 4, *Traditional measurements*, describes the results of a study made of 36 Swedish companies, all of whom measure the cost of poor quality within their business. This chapter presents the problem areas related to the measurement of poor quality costs which have been identified in the survey.
- Chapter 5, Measuring poor quality costs, describes how the costs associated with poor quality can be identified and measured. The chapter presents models for mapping poor quality costs and for the building up of measuring systems. These models represent the principal result of this thesis.
- Chapter 6, Applications, contains a description of how the models for measuring poor quality costs can be used in practice.
- Chapter 7, Case studies, describes the measurements of poor quality costs made in various companies from the point of view of the method presented in this thesis. The chapter adds practical examples of applications to the work and shows that the methods provide the intended results.
- Chapter 8, Reducing the cost of poor quality, shows how one can work actively to reduce poor quality costs in business. It also looks at the difficulties which often arise in this work.
- Chapter 9, Conclusions, contains the author's general conclusions from the project and gives some recommendations as to how the method of approach should be used. This chapter is also available on the Internet (http://www.sandholm.se).

For those academicians who are interested in the subject of poor quality costs, Lennart can highly recommend studying Dr. Sörqvist's thesis. It is published in the English language as a book containing 186 pages. Please inform Lennart at (quality@sandholm.se) or (Fax No. +46 8 755 1951), and he will be most willing to send you a copy.



REMEMBERING A NICE VISIT WITH LENNART SANDHOLM - BY KEN CASE



Surely, one of his proudest associations must be with Dr. J.M. Juran. Lennart calls Dr. Juran his





ACN. GOPAL KANJI RECEIVES KUDOS FOR JOURNAL OF APPLIED STATISTICS

Acn. Gopal Kanji joined Sheffield College of Technology in 1966 in order to "develop the applied nature of statistics" and to teach applied statistics. Sheffield College of Technology was later renamed Sheffield City Polytechnic and then became Sheffield Hallam University.

Gopal's track record in statistics is exemplary, and he sits on the council of the Royal Statistical Society and the Institute of Statisticians. He is also a member of the International Statistical Institute. He has published five books, authored numerous research papers, and presented papers on statistics and TQM in 20 countries.



In 1974, Acn. Kanji decided to produce a homegrown applied statistics journal suitable for practicing statisticians and applied researchers. This *Bulletin in Applied Statistics* (BIAS) has now transformed to a top international journal of statistics known as the *Journal of Applied Statistics*. On this, the occasion of JAS' 25th Anniversary in 1998, Vol. 25, No. 1, 1998 contains tributes from 80 well-known readers and contributors. A sampling of comments follows:



Manuscript preparation and submittal - a few guidelines to remember:

Submit two (2) copies and a disk of the paper. The manuscript should be double-spaced, with 1" margin, on letter size paper, printed on one side only. The name and format of the word processing software used must be indicated on the diskette, for text materials as well as for figures or sketches.

- Title. Keep the title length to ten words long, or fewer.
- Abstract. Provide a 150-word Abstract of main points, results, conclusions, and their significance.
- Text. The body of the paper should be about 25-30 pages long, not more, including figures and diagrams. Begin with an Introduction explaining the significance of the work discussed. Break the text into headings and subheadings. Use terminology that is widely understandable and restrict the use of acronyms and jargon. Introduce essential acronyms in parentheses following terms they abbreviate.
- Reference list. Give numbers to all cited text literature as superscripts pointed at appropriate places in the sentence. Then, list quoted references at the end of the article numerically in the order they are cited. The listing of references must be complete and typed in the same consistent style for all references: Name of author(s), or editor, full title of book or periodical or proceedings, or article, with volume number or title of a series (if it has multi-volume publications), edition (if not original), publisher's name, city of publication, year of publication, and page numbers.
- **Permission for borrowed materials**. If authors use substance from other works in their papers, they must obtain written permission to reprint the borrowed material.
- Tables and Figures. Tables and figures should be used freely wherever possible to summarize lengthy text material. Make sure to label and provide captions for all graphics, tables, and figures.
- Appendix. Technical material or material of research methodology, and analysis, etc., should be most appropriately placed in an appendix.
- Deadline for manuscript submission. October 1, 1998.

Acn. **Tito Conti** forwarded a brief summary report and letter of encouragement regarding our set of projects. Remember, one of the responsibilities (and benefits) of IAQ membership is defining, implementing, sponsoring and / or participating in IAQ projects. Following is Tito's summary (**Editor's note**! Tito's status report is dated 2 February 1998).

Tito says: As you certainly have seen from the last issue of Contact (#69, December 1997), the state of IAQ Projects is not completely satisfactory. In summary, the situation is as follows:

A few projects seem to be in good health: Projects 1 (D. Seghezzi), 2 (N. Burgess), 8 (T. Conti), 12 (E. Fuchs), 16 (O. Hartz) have made good starts and reports were sent in November by Project Leaders. The next step is to get reports in time for the Philadelphia meeting. Special praise should go to Norman Burgess, who accepted the role of P. L. of Project 2 on November 13 and on December 2 he circulated the plan and the first draft of a discussion paper. As far as I can understand, sometimes the P. L. of the above-mentioned projects has found it difficult to get timely answers from their Project Teams.

First reports of Projects 9 (N. Kano) and 10 (Y. Kondo) were announced for December. I have not received them yet. Perhaps they have been sent to *Contact*. I kindly ask Project Leaders to inform me.

A. Žaludová, P. L. of Project 19, sent a letter to *Contact*, expressing doubts about the project. She asked for opinions of other Academicians on the usefulness of an IAQ Award. Opinions are welcomed as soon as possible, for the Philadelphia meeting at the latest.

No reports have been received up to now on Projects 3 (W. Golomski), 4 (W. Kuo), 5 (M. Gatchalian, who sent a letter to K. Case, but was still at the level of preliminary thoughts), 6 (R. Wachniak), 7 (D. Luther), and 15 (B. Godfrey).

Projects 17 (C. Brendon) and 18 (B. Dale) are still one-man projects. The request for other Academicians to join is, up to now, unsuccessful. We will hear from the proponents in Philadelphia if they are still willing to consider their projects as IAQ Projects. I think that if they are, the IAQ would profit from their contributions.

In summary, the situation is well below expectations, especially in terms of Academicians involved. In fact, even where the Project Leaders are active, the support from their Teams seems to be rather low.

I kindly request the Project Leaders who have not yet provided any plan and report on the state of their projects, to do it as soon as possible, so that a complete check can be done in Philadelphia.

In fact, discussions in Orlando and Trondheim pointed out that Projects should become one of the focal points of the IAQ strategy aimed at making the Academy more visible. They should provide the main inputs to *The Best on Quality* as well as to the IAQ streams in international conferences. President Bertin confirmed that in his reports and Ken Case gave Projects high visibility in the last two issues of Contact.

My proposal is to make our best efforts to regain lost ground and come to Philadelphia with as many active projects as possible. In any case, Project Leaders should reconfirm commitment; otherwise, a decision should be made to drop the ailing Projects.

IAQ Project No. 2 - Standardization vs. Differentiation in TQM Concepts / Systems

Project leader: Acn. Norman Burgess

The project is on track, with three sets of comments (3 overdue) on the initial draft sent out in early December 1997.

When adjusted, the report will form the paper to be submitted for team circulation and for inclusion in the EOQ / EFQM Convention planned for October 1998 in Paris.

It is hoped that the wider debate at that time will be incorporated for a definitive statement at year end or early 1999.



IAQ Project No. 8: TQM Models / Business Models for Improvement

Project leader: Acn. Tito Conti. Project team: Acns. Enrique Garcia, Miflora Gatchalian, Jim Harrington, J. Claude Savard

Step 1 of Project 8 was not very successful. The purpose of Step 1 was to collect documentation on existing models. I sent out the documentation in my possession (including the St. Gallen model), but I received only from Acn. J.-C. Savard the documentation of a model

that he has developed. My proposal now, in order to save the project, is to proceed to Step 2. That was my task, sending out a draft intended to be a guideline for analyzing and classifying models. I wish to recall the purpose of the project: "To provide a valuable contribution to the rationalization and systematization of organizational models aimed at quality assurance, quality management, TQM and more generally to performance improvement." In other words, to support managers and companies to choose the right model, in relation to their needs. That means that (obviously) there is no intention to rank models or express judgments about their value, but to identify the correct fields of application, in order to avoid, for example, application of a quality assurance model in the area of business improvement.

My first request to the Academicians, who receive this mail and are not yet involved in this Project, is to offer their cooperation. It can be a specific cooperation, limited to commenting and providing suggestions on the enclosed document. Or, hopefully, it can extend to the assessment of some of the proposed models. In fact, my proposal was to analyze, assess and classify at least the following models:

- ISO 9000 Series
- ISO, Vision 2000 (in development)
- Deming Prize for Companies
- Malcolm Baldrige
- European Quality Award
- St. Gallen Model
- IQRS, originated by Det Norske Veritas
- Savard's Model
- Conti Model for Organizational Assessment
- Possibly other models, like McKinsey 7s or Nadler's Models, but in a second round

You will find enclosed my proposal of a guideline to model analysis and classification: I kindly ask you to read and comment on it, because it is intended as a template for the analysis of the specific models. Please, do it as soon as possible, since we have already accumulated a delay of 2 months in Phase 1 and we have not given up yet on the idea to present a paper next October in Paris. My request is directed in particular to Acn. Seghezzi, who in 1997 organized an International Workshop on Models in St. Gallen, and we should not miss the experience gained on that occasion. I ask then to choose one

or more models to analyze, according to the agreed upon criteria. Ideally, each model should be assessed by at least two Academicians.



IAQ Project No. 12: Business Innovation Through TQM

Project leader: Acn. Edward Fuchs. Project team: Acns. Barrie Dale, Yoshio Kondo, Shoichi Shimizu.

Editor's note! Acn. Ed Fuchs prepared a strong and interesting four page paper summarizing the status of this project. Only portions of it are presented below. In particular, those portions that present opinions of IAQ Academicians are presented. Please contact Ed for a copy.

This project is concerned with fostering innovation in all aspects of business, government and other social systems, using the approaches and paradigms of TQM. Business innovation includes the application of knowledge and creativity to epochal changes in business purpose and business systems and operations. This includes reinventing businesses and industries, in the Prahalad sense, and business process reengineering. The primary purposes of business innovation are to create new value for customers and owners, and new jobs for workers, thereby driving economic prosperity.

Is Total Quality Management compatible with Business Innovation?

Academicians Cole, Kondo, Shimizu, Seghezzi, Conti, and Sasaoka responded in the affirmative. Cole believes that TQM helps to improve the innovation process, if the process is present. Kondo cites Juran's eight lessons learned from Baldrige Award winners (Juran, 1991) as effective ways of achieving revolutionary change, e.g., innovation. Seghezzi claims that business improvement is the precursor of innovation. Conti and Sasaoka assert that appropriate definitions and models of TQM are broad and flexible enough to embrace Business Innovation. We have used diagnostic models of TQM, which were created by Dr. Luis Boza of Bell Labs, to compare the application of TQM to achieve Operational Excellence with the application of TQM to achieve Innovation Excellence.

<u>Can enterprises achieve Business Innovation within constructs of TQM models and paradigms?</u>
Academicians Cole, Shimizu, Seghezzi, Conti, and Sasaoka all vote in the affirmative. Kondo believes that the constructs of TQM models and paradigms should be flexible, thus admitting business innovation. Conti includes the proviso that the models and paradigms are not dogmatic in their definition of TQM, and provided that models are perceived as working hypotheses, evolving in time.

Describe particular TOM models or paradigms that are amenable to Business Innovation.

Two kinds of business innovation are reported in the literature - drastic and progressive. Drastic innovation is exemplified by reengineering. Progressive innovation is included in TQM approaches through continuous improvement.

Academicians identified several TQM models that possess desired characteristics: Cole – process improvement models; Kondo – Juran's Big Q and Kano's attractive quality models; Shimizu identified a Japanese model called "cross-functional management", which is similar to Business Process Reengineering; Seghezzi identified the EFQM model; Conti referenced the model he proposed in his recent book for fostering a creative environment. On the other hand, Academician Sasaoka, a voice from industry, reports that he has not found any TQM model that is sufficiently comprehensive for this purpose and yet clear and simple enough for practical use.

<u>Describe any changes or extensions of the TQM approaches mentioned in the previous question</u> that may be necessary to enable Business Innovation.

Gaining employee commitment to quality efforts can be difficult, especially when both quality and innovation are of concern. Ways of encouraging innovation and commitment to quality include i) providing meaningful challenges, ii) establishing accountability for improvement of quality, and iii) using rewards as support for intrinsic values.

Academician Cole identifies the need to address sensitivity of creative people to viewing process rules as bureaucratic constraints. Seghezzi identifies more explicit change management. Academician Conti reports that the first required extension relates to leadership. If innovation is to become a fundamental characteristic of an organization, leaders must make innovation grow as a value of the organization. Diffuse creativity should be the objective, analogous to diffused quality improvement. Sasaoka identifies the needs for addressing several issues, including information technology and the Intranet; customer feedback response system; reengineering; people empowerment; Hoshin management; and strategic business planning.

<u>Do you know of any research or studies on the compatibility of TQM with Business Innovation or into the inclusion of Business Innovation within the constructs of TQM? Provide references.</u>

Academician Cole cites "TQM in Small High Technology Companies in the Death and Life of the American Quality Movement," Michael Price and Eva Chen, Robert E. Cole, Editor, Oxford Press. Acn. Shimizu mentions that, in Japan, there are many papers and some books on the relation of business innovation and TQM, but very few in English. He cites the following books in English: I) "TQM in the Construction Industry," Matabee Kenji Maeda and Yasuji Maeda, Asian Productivity Organization, 1997, ii) "TQM With Generating Kaizen-Know-how of Japan's Quality and Productivity Movement." Books in Japanese include: I)"Strategic Management by Policy in TQM Age," Hiroshi Osada et al, JUSE Press, ii) "Strategic Management and Quality Management," Toshiyuki Mochimoto, JSA, iii) "Realization of Attractive Enterprise by TQM," Kiyoshi Ito, JUSE Press. Acn. Kume cites "Quality Management - Japan and the West," Quality, May, 1990. Acn. Sasaoka comments that many companies, such as HP, are using TQM as a process tool for business innovation. Business innovation is an objective, whereas TQM is an approach. A few references in English are given, and a few in Japanese. These references are being evaluated by Acns. Shimizu and Kondo.

Do you know of any enterprises who practice Business Innovation and TQM or who have included Business Innovation within their TQM approaches? Please provide references and/or details?

Academician Kondo mentions that Deming Prize and Baldrige Award - winning companies attempt to do this. Reference "Winning With Quality, The FPL Story," Quality Resources, 1991. According to Academician Shimizu, there are many in Japan, e.g., Maeda Corp., Aisin Groups. Academician Seghezzi mentions ABB (Asea Brown Boveri). According to Academician Sasaoka, Hewlett-Packard employs Hoshin Business Planning - Quality Maturity System; also Aishin Seiki in Japan. Overall, surprisingly few enterprises are named, given the intensity apparent in responses to previous questions.



IAQ Project No.18: Managing and Facilitating Continuous Improvement in a Regulated Supply Situation

Project leader: Acn. Barrie Dale

This project is being carried out by a Doctorate student under my supervision. Following a literature review, the initial research is being carried out within United Utilities. The Company is a multi-utility whose principal activities are in water, electricity supply and distribution, gas and telecommunications. The four Divisions operate in three different markets - monopolistic, pseudo-monopoly and competitive.

A series of semi-structured interviews (90 in total) have taken place with quality professionals and a sample of line managers within each Division, the purpose of these has been to gauge the broad issues influencing the process of managing continuous improvement. This was followed by holding a number of focus group meetings with staff to test out and probe, in more detail, the key issues associated with continuous improvement. A questionnaire survey is currently being conducted to quantify the issues arising from the qualitative research.

A tentative model, built from the literature and the initial research which reflect the barriers in managing continuous improvement in regulated supply has started to emerge. This comprises of four main issues:

- 1. Cultural (e.g., ingrained sense of the way things have always been done)
- 2. Strategic (e.g., lack of integration to the organization's core values)
- 3. Competence (e.g., inability of employees to see beyond their own departmental goals to organization-wide strategic quality issues demanded by the business environment)
- 4. Structural (e.g., insulation from competition and customers)

Once the research at United Utilities has been completed we propose to go out to the Academicians to get their input into the models, guidelines and frameworks which have been developed, prior to carrying out further research.

Acn. Masashi Asao writes:

As you know, many Japanese Academicians assist in the training courses of AOTS (the Association for Overseas Technical Scholarship) by teaching Japanese and their own experiences with introducing, developing and processing of SQC, TQC (CWQC) and TQM. I was charged some subjects for the next three courses:

- South Asia Alumni Course (SFQM 12/97)
 My Subjects: Quality Assurance;
 Management by Policy (HOSHIN KANRI);
 Cross Functional Management.
- Peru and Latin American Course (PEQM 1/98)
 My Subjects: Same as SFQM and Consultation for KAIZEN Plan.
- Factory Management in Medium Scale Industries (FMMI - 1/98-3/98)
 My Subject: Quality Assurance and Product Liability Prevention.

AOTS is a non-profit association run with Japanese government subsides from the Ministry of International Trade and Industry (MITI). Since its establishment in 1959, AOTS has been conducting various technical and management training programs in Japan for the people of developing countries. The total number of participants in past AOTS training programs amounts to nearly 75,000 from about 150 developing countries and regions. Many ex-participants in the AOTS training programs maintain close contact with AOTS and have formed AOTS Alumni Societies in their countries to promote friendship and the transfer of technology between their countries and Japan.

Acn. Gabor Aschner writes:

I have been recently awarded by General Electric their Quality Award, i.e. Quality 2000, for "Outstanding Six Sigma Leadership."

Furthermore, the Polytechnic Budapest where I conduct the one year long postgraduate course for the "Quality Engineer" degree honored me with the Mihailich Award. This award was created for the best lecturer of the year, and I was the first one who received it who was not a permanent employee of the University.

UMIST has allocated me a Project Officer for a 12 months period to develop the use of self-assessment methods with companies of less than 50 employees. The work is being carried out with the Trafford Park Business Forum. On 1 October 1997 I became the Head of the Operations Management Group within the School of Management at UMIST.

I have introduced the concept of a 'Quality Clinic' to the Trafford Park business fraternity. Companies book a half hour free consultancy with me in which they will discuss quality issues, either on an individual basis or with an operational group, and seek appropriate advice. The first clinic was held on 10 February 1998 and was fully booked within a matter of hours of it being advertised.

There is a need to document and share TQM successes in very simple terms so that people will begin to see the benefits from accepting the philosophy. So far, there has been no concrete / believable proof of its successful practice especially in the environment of the developing nations. Yes, I do agree with you about the need to develop teaching materials in small modules...not expensive, but very applied with actual "how-to's" and examples. Perhaps this can be another angle worth exploring relative to the project for developing nations. Materials

like these, if made available and, if possible, presented by the authors themselves would be most interesting in developing countries. Perhaps this can be linked with the APQO Conferences and / or annual meetings. Would you know who could be interested to participate in this endeavor?

Thanks for the absolutely fabulous job you are doing on *Contact*. You have definitely engaged in the continuous improvement we all preach but so rarely practice. Some notes follow about my recent activities:

Last year was the best in thirteen years for Juran Institute (Dr. Juran still argues that 1984 was better, and we don't dare disagree - but that was before my time so it is ancient history). That means we are all happy but exhausted. The new year has also started out fast. Last month I was in Thailand starting work with the national oil company, in Malaysia working with the Ministry of Health on a new project to create a national health care quality system that formally starts next month, and in Amsterdam for the first meeting of a new benchmarking cooperative on purchasing and supply-chain management.

Tuesday I leave for Switzerland where I will join other academicians participating in Academician Hans Dieter Seghezzi's special retirement executive management conference. From Switzerland I go to India to give four seminars to launch a new strategic alliance we have there with the National Institute of Information Technology, and "stop over" on

my way back in Iceland to review the first publication of a "balanced scorecard" of a client there. While there I will also participate in the National University Hospital's one-day special conference on quality in health care.

In March I shall host a visit by Academician Juhani Anttila in Wilton and then leave immediately to join Academician Lennart Sandholm for a one-day seminar in Stockholm. I'll stay there afterwards to act as opponent for Sandholm's Ph.D. student, Lars Sorqvist. On January 5 - 8, 1998, Acn. Way Kuo was conference chair for the 1998 National Science Foundation Design and Manufacturing Grantees Conference in Monterrey, N.L., Mexico. This was the first time the conference

A few days after my return in November from Europe, we learned that my older son had a brain tumor. My wife, my younger son, and I went to be with him in Minneapolis during the surgery on December 5th. Fortunately, the tumor was benign. It was said to be the size of an orange. I hope 1998 is a great year for each of you and your family.

Acn. Dave Luther writes:

"Quality, The Future and You" is a nine month research and study effort we put together a couple of years ago at AQC. The results of the effort have had real impact on the Society and start with the name change, the change in governance, and redirection on several internal efforts. Another outcome has been a talk on "Futures" that I have given a great number of times, and from that, a workshop has been developed. The workshop is for CEO's, or other leaders who have institutional responsibility. The interactive workshop takes about four hours, and uses four scenarios for the future, along with nine general forces we think are important. The purpose is to get the audience to think about the future, and figure out what should be done today to prepare for it. I gave it for **Marcos Bertin**'s people in B.A., just completed a session in Sweden, and have done it several times in the U.S.

On another front, we have just finished a two year effort to create, train and help direct teams in local communities that are interested in reducing teenage driving fatalities. The exercise was with Don Berwick of IHI, and involved ASQ as local teachers of quality methods. The project is written up in several articles in the current *Quality Progress*. The general premise is that problem solving in the US is moving away from the federal government, away from state government, and towards local efforts. We believe quality methods have a great deal to offer to make this move successful.

The major initiative taking about seventy hours a week is in my role as Vice President of Operations, Finance and Administration at a start-up company that sells electrical energy over the Web. It is called Green Mountain Energy Resources, and is located in Burlington, Vermont where I now live.

It became clear to me about two years ago that the rules of organization and management were changing. Approaches that were terrific in the late 1980's and early 1990's were not good enough any more. Speed, globalization, partnership management, and especially information technology were changing almost everything. Mass customization is no longer a buzz word, and brand management on the WEB is a major force for marketing. Books, articles and consultants in general do not seem to be at the leading edge of this, so I decided to experience the change on a personal basis and get a first hand view.

I accepted an eighteen-month full time assignment at this new company. We have received forty million dollars from a venture capital firm in Dallas and are currently after another fifty million. We are tracking the deregulation of electrical energy in the U.S. California is first, and has already moved. Several other states are close behind. It is a 210 billion market, and is larger than all other deregulated businesses combined. We are after residential customers only and sell energy that comes only from renewable sources, hence our emphasis as an environmentally supportive company.

I manage an information network that involves ten other companies across the county that sign up our customers, provide billing and customer care, store addresses, provide data warehousing and support a very extensive information technology network. I have call centers in the east and mid-west and other companies in and near California. We are a virtual company that avoids fixed assets, sub contracts all high transaction processes, and spends millions learning about individual customers. We have profiled over one million families in California, and attempt to predict buying behavior based on personal attributes and actions.

It is either the best move I have ever made, or the worst. Bottom line is that I have not worked this hard for a long time. In any event, this exercise is taking virtually all of my time in 1998.

In addition, I give you the following news:

- 1. My retirement on 31 March 1998: With an age of 65, I become Professor Emeritus at the end of March. Today, I present my "retirement" lecture with the title "TQM a Trojanian Horse?" It deals with the contribution of scholars and the future of management, award models and quality management as a discipline. After my retirement, I will stay active in a number of organizations, including IAQ.
- 2. Executive Forum in St. Gallen: This year our Institute for Technology Management is selected as the organizer of the Executive Forum in St. Gallen. The university has chosen the title "World Class Quality and Integrated Management," honoring my 10 years' work at our university. Five of the 14 speakers are IAQ Acns. Godfrey, Golomski, Kume, Masing and myself.
- 3. ISO looks for compatibility of its management standards: The industry is not satisfied with the two ISO standard series 9000 and 14000 as far as differences in structure, conflicting content and inconsistent use of terms is concerned. To improve compatibility, the ISO Technical Management Board (TMB) established a Technical Advisory Group (TAG 12) in 1997 which delivered its report and its recommendations to the TMB and the two

Technical Committees - TC 176 and TC 207 in January 1998. As a member of TAG 12, I expect full compatibility of the two standards in the year 2000 and 2001.

4. EFQM Representation Meeting and Learning Edge Conference in Rome, April 28 to 30, 1998: During this event the draft of the new European Quality Award model will be presented for the first time to a broader audience. The draft will be discussed in two workshops which I shall moderate.


- Participation in 5/97 in the meetings of IEC
