

First Report of the Six-Man Board o f the International Association for Quality

For the Six-Man Board of the International Association for Quality

It is a great priviledge for me, as Chairman of the Six-Man Board of the International Association for Quality, to report on behalf of my associates to you today at this simply wonderful set of meeting on quality and reliability, sponsored by Britain.

Quality control has, of course, always been an international activity. Indeed, the work of Walter Shewhart was brought to some of its early prominence in the lectures he was invited to give in Britain in the early 30's. Since that time, there has been an increasing interchange of information, of counsel and of advice among quality control men throughout the world. Certainly, the international emphasis of quality control has been part, not only of the formal quality control bodies in our respective countries, but also of the work of several of their members. For instance the international contributions are well known of several distinguished

Americans, such as Professor Paul Clifford, Dr. W. Edwards Deming, Dr. J.M. Juran, Dr. Sebastian Littauer, Dr. Ellis Ott and Dr. William Pabst, to name only some of the luminaries. The European Organisation for Quality Control, in its very formation, has been a multi-national body, and I must, of course, particularly note that the inauguration of the International Association for Quality's work came from Ir. Jan Van Ettinger during his term of office as President of the EOQC. The Japanese Union of Scientists and Engineers has always been highly internationally minded, and there is no organisation which has been highly assiduous - through its many quality control and productivity teams - in making available to the entire world key Japanese technologists. Indeed, the late and distinguished Managing Director of JUSE, Dr. Kenichi Koyanagi, was recognised for this very purpose of his help to world wide quality control when he was named Edwards Medalist by ASQC.

Thus any assignment to further world interchange of world quality control information has the great advantage of being able to start with the foundation laid by these great men and the numbers of others who have helped them.

The Approach

Within recent years, two cartoons have circulated among many of our countries, and their message may be worth mentionning at this point. The first cartoon shows a group of men sitting round a table with their feet on it, and with a caption reading: "One of these weeks we are going to have to get organised around here". The second cartoon shows the same group of men, their feet still on the desks, with the caption: "Now that we are organised, what in the world do we do?"

The Six-Man board of the International Association for Quality has tried to avoid the trap shown by this cartoon series and to place initial emphasis upon work and content rather than form, upon interchange of experience for example, no matter how achieved, and then, and only then, to determine what is the form of organisation which might most readily facilitate the achievement of these ends. Therefore, I would like to direct my further remarks to you under the three headings which deal with our

content. <u>First</u> the history of the work of the Six-Man Board to date. <u>Second</u>, the current work activities which are under way & <u>third</u>, the direction of future developments.

History

Let us begin with the history of the work of the Six-Man Board. You will recall that, after the suggestion by the European Organisation for Quality Control for exploration of IAQ, there were named six men whose assignment it has been to recommend to their respective member bodies by 1971 a permanent organisation plan to facilitate world interchange on quality control: The EOQC named as its two directors Mr. Frank Nixon, past President of the European Organisation for Quality Control and past Chairman of the National Council for Quality and

Reliability for Great Britain, And Mr.

Georges Borel, member of the Board of the OEQC and General Secretary of the French Association for Industrial Quality Control. Meeting with the Board during its first sessions in Stockholm last year for the Japanese Union of Scientists and Engineers was Professor Ishikawa, the eminent professor and leader of the quality control movement in Japan, and also with us last year was Professor Masao Kogure,

Professor of engineering. This year we have been favoured not only with the presence of Professor Ishikawa but also with that of the distinguished Professor Asaka, in place of Professor Kogure. Representing the American Society for Quality Control has been Mr. E.J. Lancaster past President and past Chairman of the Board, and the American whose Presidential address initiated direct action by ASQC in terms of the IAQ; and it is my good fortune also to have been named by ASQC to serve.

The first formal meetings of the IAQ Six-Man Board took place in June 1966 in New York City and later in that month in Stockholm. Over the past year, based upon work assignments agreed to in these first meetings, there has been a voluminous exchange of correspondence, numerous small-group meetings of

members of this Six-Man Board and careful development of the agenda of the second formal series of meetings of the Six-Man Board which have been taking place over the last several days here in London in June of 1967.

The work of the Six-Man Board has been greatly expedited by the close spirit of co-operation and cordiality which has existed among the directors, who immediately agreed that their work needed to be organised as that of colleagues in close informal consultation rather than that of a highly formalised organisation to do the job.

Work Programs

Now let me turn to the second topic of work programs that are currently under way. As a result of the extensive studies that have been carried out during the past year, three principles have become quite apparent to the members of the Six-Man Board: The first is that it would not be practical to speed the 1971 organisational date for formal recommendation of a permanent organisation; the second is that the close integration required among the members of the Board suggests that the membership should not be expanded during this organisational period; the third is that action may be initiated in a number of areas which could bring the benefits of some quality control interchange earlier than 1971. I will now report to you on some of these later actions which have already been undertaken.

For one matter, work is currently under way to initiate the establishment of an International Quality Information Service. One objective of this service is to foster the dissemination of abstracts of papers throughout the several member bodies. Another objective of this service is to develop and make available a basic list of existing quality literature that will, it is hoped, be useful to all members who wish to review key international literature pieces in quality control. A third objective is to develop and make available lists of key quality control experts in the several countries to facilitate correspondence and visitation. A second work area is to promote even closer international cooperation in certain areas that are thought to be of particular technical interest to the international membership. To this point, work has been begun to promote close integration among technical committees currently at work in three member bodies, in the following eight fields: Specifications; quality costs; statistical

application; quality information equipment; industrial training; management involvement; systems engineering; and reliability prediction. Technical committees currently at work in JUSE in ASQC and in EOQC will be asked if they will be willing to broaden the base of their operations and to carry the burden for this work.

Moreover, as a third work area and in order to widen the availability of international quality control developments at already planned conferences of each member body, if and as appropriate, the Six-Man Board will make available to its member bodies <u>IAQ sessions</u> which will deal principally with world developments in quality control. For instance, ASQC will look forward to the sponsorship of an International Association for Quality Control session at our 1968 Annual Technical Conference in Philadelphia in May. Also, the International Association for Quality is delighted to support the plans of the Japanese Union of Scientists and Engineers for an international conference on quality control in Tokyo in 1969 whose theme is to be <u>"World Prosperity Through Quality"</u>, a conference that will be held in co-ordination with the American Society for Quality Control and the European Organisation for Quality Control.

These are three of the major work subjects that are planned. If there were time, I would report to you on many further work details and programs that we have considered but the ones that have been discussed are representative of the approach that is being taken.

Future Developments

Now let me turn to the report of future developments – my third topic. You will have noted for the remarks so far that the international Association for Quality Six-Man Board has tried to put its emphasis upon work that can be carried on <u>currently</u> in the service of the members of our several bodies. We have been guided by tentative studies which have been developed over the past many months and by a set of objectives that will be rendered to our member bodies. The principal area of future development is in the work that has been begun and will be carefully progressed over the coming months bearing upon the permanent organisational recommendations for IAQ leading into 1971. We know that this will not be an easy task but we are most encouraged with respect to its successful outcome by the

progress that has already been made in the short one year of operation of the Six-Man Board.

Conclusion

Let me once again, on behalf of my colleagues on the Six-Man Board, express to you the gratitude that we feel in your confidence in having selected us to recommend to you the longer term plans for an International Association for Quality. We wish to express our very deep thanks to the British Productivity Council for its very great kindness to us during these sessions. I might add that in the establishment of the administrative services required for the establishing of the International Quality Information Service, we are being favoured by consultation and assistance by this British Productivity Council.

Ladies and gentlemen, it has been well expressed by many that quality in all of its forms - reliability, appearance, safety, main-

tainability - is one of the fundamentals to the improved use of national resources, to higher standards of living for all of our citizens, and, in fact, to the improvement of world trade which means so much, not only to our respective economies, but also to international understading itself.

Hopefully, the work of your International Association for Quality may in some small measure contribute to these worthwhile objectives that are so firmly entrenched in the minds and hearts of all of us. We appreciate your having given us this time to make this report. It will be our priviledge to make copies available to each of our member bodies in the hope that they may wish to make it available for publication in their journals so that it may be read and commented upon by all our members.



IAQ PROJECTS STATUS AND FUTURE DIRECTIONS

(ANAHEIM, MAY 27 1999, AND MADRID, JUNE 8, 1999)

THE SITUATION

The current list of IAQ Projects was prepared in Orlando (May 1997) and reviewed in Trondheim

 in June 1997 (see table below). Fifteen Projects were kept and responsibilities were assigned.
 The situation after two years is summarized in the following.

Results of Project 2 and 4 have been presented as papers at the EOQ Congress in Madrid and will be published in Best on Quality, vol 11. The objectives set by the Project Leaders have been met. However the themes have such broad scopes that further research by Academicians is desirable.

Project 17 was completed and will be published in Best on Quality, Vol. 11.

Project 8 's intermediate results have been presented as papers in Madrid and in Sheffield (TQM Congress, June 99) and as an article on European Quality (Vol. 6, n. 1). The Project target will be met after publication on Best on Quality, vol 11. This project too is so broad in scope that research should continue by Academicians.

Project 1 has generated intermediate documents that were circulated. Final results will be presented at the EOQ Congress in Budapest in June 2000.

Project 16 is an ongoing research carried out by the Scandinavian Group of Academicians: it has already generated papers for Best on Quality and will continue to do so.

A good deal of work has been done by the relevant Project Leaders on Projects 12 and 18.

Projects 3, 5, 6, 9, 10, 11 and 15 have not started yet, for different reasons. Project 6 has no Project Leader now, since R. Wachniak resigned.

In summary, a little bit more than 50% of the Projects generated significant activity. However, the great majority of the projects were carried out by the Project Leaders alone, with scarce participation by team members. That means that only a bunch of Academicians have really been involved in the IAQ Projects in the last two years.

Something has to be done if we want to foster Academicians participation to Projects.

Future directions - Conclusions of the discussions held in Anaheim and Madrid.

We should focus on a very short list of "major" IAQ Projects: two or three, not more. They should have high visibility and the highest priority on the IAQ agenda. They should be organized in a structured way around a core that is either a University Research Center or a similar entity commanding the right kind of resources. The head of such entity should be an Academician. Other Academicians could join the group. External funds should be sought for each of those major projects. Possible sources of funds could be the Commission of the European Union, other regional or national entities, the ASQ etc. Such projects should be used to increase IAQ visibility throughout the World.

Some possible themes were identified in Anaheim, as candidates to the title of "major IAQ projects":

 E-Commerce and quality (11 votes in Anaheim). This title was preferred to the alternative title "E-Commerce and customer protection" because it was perceived as more comprehensive.

- Developing nations and quality (6 votes in Anaheim). The issue should convey the IAQ vision in terms of social quality, quality of life, etc.
- Standardization and differentiation of organizational systems in relation to excellence (5 votes).

Interest in the first and third themes was confirmed in Madrid, not in the second one (however in Madrid only six Academicians were present, three of which were also present in Anaheim).

We should keep the existing list of projects and continuously update and enrich it through proposals coming from individual Academicians or groups of them. In fact, limiting the IAQ Projects to the major ones (if any) could lead to a decrease in Academicians' participation, which is exactly the opposite of what we are pursuing. Our purpose should be to encourage contribution from Academicians and at the same time provide good material for B. on Q. (restricting on major projects would lead to just a few monographic issues of B. on Q.). The "extended list" would be presented to the Academicians only as a suggestion.

If an Academician, or a group of them, wants to start a research under the IAQ name, he/she should make the proposal to the Project Board and, if accepted, carry out it according to the established rules (in that case the new theme will be added to the IAQ Project list). If some Academicians spontaneously aggregate into a group to initiate a project, they should behave as a self-managed team.

A "project team" solution is always preferred, but individuals can also conduct a project. In any case the Academician responsible for the project should start by presenting a project plan - complete with title, expected results, time schedule – and should report at least once a year (prior to the ASQ or the EOQ Conference) on the state of the project, updating the forecast for the results. Different Academicians – or groups of them – should be allowed to work independently on the same theme (specially when points of view differ). However, co-operation should be pursued in any case. In fact, the output of the researches should converge into a Best on Quality issue, or

Conference session, and in those cases harmonization (that does not mean eliminating differences) is necessary.

Create very close links between Projects, IAQ Sessions at major Conferences and Best on Quality. Common planning is needed for the three activities, if we want to increase quantity and preserve quality.

Create links with external entities (Universities, Research Centers) to share research work and possibly get research funds (see above, for major projects, but this should be a general aim, whatever the project).

Use performance indicators for Academicians for recognizing their contribution to IAQ visibility and good reputation through the Project activity.

NEXT STEPS

Academicians interested in "major projects" should submit their plans to the Project Board (Conti, Fuchs, Hromi, Kano).

Interest in conducting other major projects according to the proposed rules should be submitted to the board.

The list in the above table ("extended list") should be updated on the basis of inputs from the Project Leaders of those Projects that have still to start (Projects 3, 5, 9, 10, 11, 15): confirmation or cancellation.

Possible candidates for Project 6 (if no candidates, we will cancel it).

Check the interest in the following new titles proposed in Anaheim/Madrid:

Quality and corporate governance (CEOs, Corporate Boards and Quality). This is a theme studied by President Marcos Bertin, who made a presentation in Anaheim on the subject. My personal opinion is that the theme is very important for corporate excellence and, if M. Bertin agrees, could be added to the list (major or extended list?).

I shall prepare a report before year end, based on the answers received.



MAJOR ACTIVITIES AND CONCLUSIONS

THE EOQ ANNUAL CONFERENCE



I have been in Rio, Macae, Buenos Aires and Valparaiso invited by the marine authorities and the marine communities to present the benefits of the IT in quality and safety systems.

CROATIA

Invited as a key note speaker by the International Association of Maritime Lecturers, I opened the one week convention, at the city hall, with a presentation on "Safety Management Improvement".

LUXEMBURG

I gave two lectures. First one on "the role the industry to manage new challenges for the benefit of the people" and "The impact of the new safety requirements on business"

SWEDEN

The World wide Marine University, part of the UNO programme asked me to give more new courses on quality and management. So, I gave lectures in June.

POLAND

In September, I will be the Keynote speaker, at the Conference, organised by the International Society of Commodity Science and Technology.

GERMANY

In October, I will be the keynote speaker at the International Conference on Safety in port environment.

IRAN

In October, I will be again, the Keynote speaker, at the Conference, organised by the IRISL; I will talk for three Hours on Quality and Safety management.

INTERNATIONAL ASIA PACIFIC QUALITY AWARD

Pacific Quality Organization has established an annual International Asia Pacific Quality Award that recognizes organizations that have the best quality management systems within the Asia Pacific region. This award is administered by the Walter L. Hurd Foundation, an organization established by the Asia Pacific Quality Organization. To accomplish this, an International Asia Pacific Quality Award Council has been formed.

To be eligible for the award, the organization must have won their National Quality Award and that National Quality Award process must include an on-site validation of the data that the National Award utilized to judge the organization and meet the award standards set by the International Asia Pacific Quality Award Council.

In order not to reduce the prestige of the National Quality Award Organizations, the Internatioanl Asia Pacific Quality Award Council will include the National Quality Award Organizations as part of the selection process, by having them screen and validate the applications to determine which candidates from their country should be submitted for International Asia Pacific Quality Award.

The 21st Century,

DECLARATION

and services are s we enter the 21st more important Century, quality products than they have Land services are more important than they have ever ever been. ... been. In the 21st Century, quality systems must address all of the organization's stakeholders, not just its customers. The quality system must provide value-added content to management, investors, customers, consumers, suppliers, employees, and their families, and the community/mankind. Today the quality challenge is to move past quality of products and services to quality of life. All processes must be designed so that they can provide errorfree output.

High quality is the key to pride, productivity, competitiveness, and profitability. The quality objective must be products and services that meet or exceed customer requirements. Products and services must delight our customers. To be successful, the quality activities must be management led and consumer oriented. Management, labor, academia, and government support for quality improvement is essential for effective competition in the global market place. Control of quality must be a strategic business imperative essential to product and service leadership.

Quality improvement, however, is more than a business strategy – it is a personal responsibility, and a key source of national pride. Quality commitment is an attitude, formulated in boardrooms and living rooms, visible on factory floors and service counters, expressed in concert halls and city halls, and demonstrated on playing fields and wheat fields. Quality demands a continuous improvement process with measurable individual, corporate, and national performance goals.

Quality commitment must characterize the best of our relations with our fellow citizens and play a vital role in our search for global co-operation. Although there has been a great deal of improvement made in quality

throughout the world over the last fifty years, there are still big opportunities for improvement as we enter the 21st Century.

CALL TO ACTION

The importance of quality is now recognized worldwide. This Quality Manifesto declares that renewed emphasis on quality of products, ser-

vices, and life must be made and maintained as an international priority. Specifically, there is immediate need for the following actions:

- Leaders of government have the primary responsibility to declare and define the importance of quality as a national and interrelational priority. They must make clear that quality, which enhances productivity and reduces costs, is the most effective competitive strategy for economic survival and prosperity. All government products and services must be procured and dispensed with a relentless pursuit of quality. Government service should be the benchmark for other service organizations.
- Business and labor communities must encourage and intensify their support for quality improvements in all aspects of manufacturing, support, and service operations. They must work together to provide output that represents real value to their customers.
- The educational community must set higher standards of academic performance and achievement to aid in meeting the expectations

- of the general public for high-quality products and services at minimum cost. It must apply quality methodologies to its own operations.
- Professional and trade associations must assist all segments of society in reaching these quality goals. They must provide leadership in the discovery and dissemination of new quality technologies.
- Individuals must pledge dedication to the attainment, maintenance, and enhancement of quality in all aspects of life.
- The quality professional must set personal quality standards that set the example for all other individuals in society. Six-sigma error rates are unacceptable. The quality professional's behavior must be near perfection,

- always on time to every meeting, with output that meets customer expectations.
- The family needs to come together as a tightknit team with common goals and objectives. Quality of life starts in the home and cannot exist without the support of a loving family. Quality methodologies need to be used to reinforce the quality of family life.

We, the academicians of the International Academy for Quality, attest to the urgent need for a renewed and intensified national and international commitment to quality, and issue this Manifesto as a challenge to achieve these ends.

ACN ZALUDOVA'S PASSING

ill Golomski suggested that some of us may wish to prepare expressions of fond memories of Acn. Agnes Zaludova. Since I may be one of the academicians to have seen her last, I wish to share with you a few words about that experience.

As I informed you earlier, I spoke in Zilina, Slovakia on November

13th, after which the current President of the Czech Society for Quality, Ing. Jan Hnatek (who also spoke in Zilina) drove me to Prague. On the way, he contacted Agnes (Nana) by cell phone to tell her we were on the way and what our approximate time of arrival at Nana's would be. She said that she had a "light" meal prepared for my arrival. When we finally arrived at her house, a sumptuous mead awaited me. Even though I was tired from the long drive (six hours), I delayed going to bed in her basement apartment because she just wanted to talk. One

remark that she made I remember distinctly: How

long are we going to keep on doing what we have

been doing professionally? She seemed tired.

But the next day, the 14th, she was her usual self, brimming with energy. She kept going strong all day long. In the morning, we drove by some housing development that she thought I might want to see. Then we visited the Prague office of the National Training Fund, after which she took me to the office of the Czech Society for Quality (at the Charles Bridge) for lunch with some of the leaders of the Society. Following our lunch, we met with the leaders and other key players in a Society conference room. There we discussed some revenue producing ideas and the scheduling of joint ventures for the fall of 1999. Since there was time before dinner, Nana proudly introduced me to her younger daughter who with her husband owned and operated what appeared to be a

thriving imaging business. For dinner, Nana and I were guests of Eva Bosakova, a supervisory person in the National Training Fund. Next, Mrs. Bosakova and her husband were able to arrange for an extra pair of tickets for a performance of the Prague Philharmonic Orchestra. So you see my day with Nana was quite full.

Early the next morning, it was time to depart for

the airport. She and one of her grandsons drove me there and helped with the luggage. Nana even came inside to make sure that I got away properly. That was the last time I saw her.

I forgot to mention above, that as we walked through old town, she told me of her plans to visit her sister in London. She had a garnet ring made as a birthday gift for her. Nana's two daughters were to accompany her, but only for a short while. Nana planned to stay on a bit longer.

It was only sixty days later that I learned from Ray Wachniak of Nana's passing. It was quite a shock to learn that this vibrant lady was no longer with us. I presume that she died in London, hence the burial there.

Late last summer, she was nominated for the E. J. Lancaster Award which she coveted. I don't know who the selection committee chose as the 1998 awardee, but now she'll never know the outcome. Perhaps, IAQ can find some way to honor her.


I've known Nana for over thirty years, during which time I developed a lasting respect for her professionalism and devotion to quality improvement.



THE NEW ACADEMICIAN DR. T. N. GOH, PROFESSOR AT THE NATIONAL UNIVERSITY OF SINGAPORE



'ew Academician Dr. T. N. Goh, Professor at the National University of Singapore, visited the Division of Quality Technology & Statistics at the Lulea University of Technology in Sweden. During his visit of June 8-9, 1998, he was the faculty opponent for the doctoral thesis of Mats Deleryd and interacted with the students and staff in various ways. Acn Goh did his introductory speech in Anaheim on May 26th M. Xie, T. N. Goh (IAQ Academician), and H. Wang of the National University of Singapore published an article in the December, 1998 issue of the International Journal of Industrial Engineering: "A Study of the Sensitivity of 'Customer Voice' in QFD Analysis." The Analytical Hierarchy Process method of Saaty is used. The significance of their research is that: "A small change of weights is shown not to affect the final ranking of the technical responses in the House of Quality; hence QFD is a robust method for prioritization. The result suggests that we can spend more time with the relationship metrics and other issues when using QFD."

IAQ MEETING IN ANAHEIM

MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

hairman Kondo opened the meeting with remarks to the memory of our friend Acn. Zalodova who past away so suddenly and left a big gap in our small community.

President Bertin shortly presented the IAQ activity report and emphasized the following accomplishments:

- Communication
- Best on Quality
- Contact
- Projects
- International recognition of IAQ members
- Cooperation with the ASQ

President Bertin has also mentioned some weaknesses that should be improved such as:

- Non-Active members
- Lack of participation in conferences
- · Academicians do not reply to IAQ initiatives

President Bertin has reported the results of the voting on the IAQ office relocation. Over two third of the Academicians voted and accept the relocation proposal.

The Board decided that chairman Kondo and President Bertin will initiate a meeting at the ASQ headquarter in Milwaukee to conclude the subject.

Upon Past Chairman Harrington estimation the relocation process will take a year.

Contact publisher Savard has summarized his first year assignment. The main comments are:

- Slow reply of the Academicians
- Lack of reply of the Asian Members
- Authors will report abstracts of their new books
- Vice Presidents will report activities in special sections

Best on Quality editor Sinha has reported his activity. The main comments are:

- Vol. No. 10 was published on time.
- The target time for publishing the new books is toward the annual Quality Conferences
- Sinha will forward a letter to those Academicians who did not contribute an article since three years period
- In all the new books, the abstracts of the article are at the first part and authors biographies at the end of the books
- Delivery of articles is preferred by E-Mail
- Team work and projects reporting is recommended (like in Yokohama)

Vice president Conference Bester reported his six years of assignment. During this period, the IAQ managed seminars, sessions and panels in thirty major international conferences.

The most active was in Yokohama 1996, there 33 Academicians took part in managing seminar, session, panel and strategy discussion.

Bester has mentioned the lack of success to organize the First Executive Symposium.

The third organizing company, Collpits from Boston, decided to avoid the risk to invest their own money due to the poor reply of the Academicians to the letters regarding names of potential CEO's, participation in various activities, raising fund, Etc.

It was decided that the responsibility for organizing IAQ streams in major conferences would be assigned by the V.P Conferences to an academician represents the host country.

Acn. Luther brought a special reporting on the relocation process needs, such as:

- Attorneys audit of the process
- Free taxation status No. 501.3
- IAQ officers (President and Treasurer)
- Formal annual meetings

The motion of this resolution should perform by the general meeting.

Past-Chairman Feignbaum thanked Acn. Luther for his dedication to this matter.

Vice President Golomski has reminded that the IAQ constitution should be revised toward the IAQ office relocation. Golomski asked each Academician to update his biography periodically and send it to the IAQ office.

Vice President Conti, presented a short review of the 18 projects (more detailed review is planed for the general meeting). Most of the projects finally become "one man job" instead of teamwork. Harrington has suggested that projects will be managed as joint venture with universities. The deeper discussion on these project issues was scheduled for the next day general meeting.

Acn. Aune has presented his reporting on the nominations. The "high lights" were:

- In the Academy are 66 active members
 - 38 in Europe
 - 19 in America
 - 17 in Asia and Australia
 - 2 in Africa and Middle-East

Proper selection of nomination is a major "success factor" for the IAQ

We must implement the idea of "associate members" and the constitution should be revised to accept it.

It was agreed that in the recent meeting there is a quorum for the approval of nominations of new officers for the next three years.

This year had very sad news in store for us, right at its beginning. Our dear colleague Acn. Agnes Zaludova is no longer with us. She died on January 13, in Prague. What a loss!

My thoughts go back to my first acquaintance with her which soon became a close personal frienship. The year was 1960 and the European Organization for Quality Control (today EOQ) was still a fledgling, a hopeful grous of Quality-related organizations from 5 West-European countries. It was about to prepare its next yearly conference in Torino/Italy. There was a letter from Czechoslovakia written by a lady, Dr. Agnes Zaludova. She offered a paper on some special aspects of statis-

tics as a tool within the industry. At that time it was quite extraordinary that a lady could work in this field, and it was also the first contact from the other side of the Iron Curtain. Could she deliver the paper in English? Oh yes, no problem. She informed us that she was born and raised in Scotland, had studied mathematics and obtained a doctor's degree in Applied Mathematics from the University of Glasgow. She had married a displaced Czech engineer and moved to his native Prague. There she had joined the Applied

Mathematics Division of the National Research Institute for Machine Design, working successfully on various projects of sampling procedures and process control. This eventually lead to her chairpersonship of this division. We got interested. She was invited to the Torino conference of EOQC.

We met with a truly remarkable person. Not only was her paper perfect, but she enlivened the discussions of the whole event with her intelligent remarks. Everybody was impressed. This was the start of a lasting relationship.

Nana was among the 6 persons from Europe on the "3 x 6 Men" committee which founded IAQ. From then on she has barely missed one of our meetings. Her contributions were always timely, intelligent and useful. We will miss her dearly!

SUMMARY OF PROJECT STATUS

- Two Projects completed (# 4 and 17). The latest was presented in Paris by Acn. Brendon. Decision has to be taken about publication.
- Project #2 almost completed and presented in Paris by Acn. Burgess. After some "cosmetic" improvements it will be submitted to the Project Board for publication on BOQ.
- Two Projects in stand by (#2 and 8), waiting for Acn's cooperation (both Team members and others).
 If effective cooperation is not attainable, Project Leaders can complete them for May 99. But the scope will be limited and the goal of co-operative research will be missed.

- Project # 1: status reported by Acn. Seghezzi in Paris. Project has reached a point where further activity would be very difficult. Project Leader will summarize results and circulate them before Anaheim, so that a decision can be made there as to whether we continue on specific aspects.
- Project Team 16 has met regularly. They have positively interpreted their role within meetings at regular intervals for discussing issues and fostering individual contributions to Best on Quality (five papers were contributed for BOQ Vol. 9, three for BOQ Vol. 10). Now they have planned a co-operative effort aiming at a Team contribution to BOQ Vol.11.
- Projects # 3, 5, 10, 11, 15 have been confirmed by Project Leaders, but apparently they are still in the beginning phase.
- For Project #6, Acn. Wachniak proposal to collect case studies, since a full research work would need funds and scholarship research, has been accepted.
- Project 9 has been postponed, till Acn. Kano's overload due to his current University special assignment is eased.
- Project 18 remains an Acn. Dale's project;
 IAQ's interest is confirmed.
- Project 19's scope will be limited to the IAQ internal award.

COMMENTS

- Most Academicians seem too busy to manage co-operative projects. However some results are coming to light.
- Scarce support to Project Leaders from their Teams, with some positive exceptions.
- Internet connection necessary for teamwork on projects.
- Information about Projects on "Contact" should be subjected to IAQ Project Board review, for consistency.

PROPOSALS

- Appoint an IAQ Project Board of three Acn's: the V. P. for Projects plus other two Acn's, to improve planning and control.
- Joint planning of IAQ Projects, Best on Quality issues and IAQ sessions at future Conferences. Linking Projects to BOQ and offcial IAQ participation to Conferences should increase motivation to participate in Projects.
- Consider active participation to joint activities (Projects, BOQ, Conferences) as part of the criteria for assessing Acn's contribution to IAQ.
- Acn. Spencer proposes the use of Telephone Conference Calls for periodical reporting. He will check with ASQ and report about the cost.

\$40-M HELP FOR FIRMS TO STREAMLINE

The Government will pay out this sum of money over the next five years to help firms keep their operations lean.

The Government will pay out \$40 million over the next five years to help local firms streamline operations and save on inefficiency costs.

Minister Without Portfolio Lim Boon Heng said yesterday that the \$40-million investment will help 1,000 companies save up to \$250 million in "costs of quality".

The new National Cost of Quality scheme will encourage companies to examine how they can use resources more efficiently, and hire consultants to minimise waste in their operations.



NEWS FROM ACN GOLOMSKI

The June 1998 issue of the International Journal of Quality, Reliability and Safety Engineering contains an article

co-authored by Acn. Goh:

"A Procedure For Monitoring High Quality Processes With Correlated Measurements." To quote from the introduction: "Presently,

high quality processes,

particularly those in the electronics industry such as integrated circuits manufacturing, have all entered a period where ppm or parts per billion (ppb) is the norm for defective or non-conforming rates. Traditional Shewhart charts are not applicable to such high quality processes, especially when the items are inspected one at a time, since these charts give a large number of false alarms and a useless negative lower control limit. A new type of chart called the CCC chart, which is based on counting the cumulative number of conforming items between two non-conforming ones, has been shown to be very useful in this case."

Marketing Science Institute, WWW.msi.org, of Cambridge, Massachusetts in the USA is a research organization that enables marketing practitioners and scholars to share perspectives on the creation, use, and transfer of knowledge.

Dr. Robit Despande, Executive Director of MSI, and the Harvard Business School, espouses "Theory C" management: cross-functional, crossdisciplinary, cross-cultural, customer-centric and conversation-catalytic.

Research reports on work in progress are for sale. Here is an example:

"Report No. 98-117, Working paper, \$16.00 Trust and Concern in Consumers' Perceptions of Marketing Information Management Practices. Demonstrates that improving consumer trust and reducing consumer concern are two distinct approaches to consumer information management; suggests that improving trust may be a more effective approach to fostering strong consumer/organization relationships."

On November 13th, he met with the Executive Director, the President, Acn. Agnes Zaludova, and other officers and members of the Czech Slovak Society for Quality.



SUMMARY OF NEW ACADEMICIAN JENS J-DAHLGAARD'S SPEECH ABOUT "SOME EXPE-RIENCES IN INPLEMENTING TOM IN HIGHER EDUCATION"


cn. Jens J. Dahlgaard presented his experiences since 1993 as he tried to implement Total Quality Management principles and methods in higher education. His

lected firstly from an lected firstly from an international seminar on Quality in Higher Education held in Denmark in 1993, and which was supported by the European Commission. The conclusion from the seminar was that TQM principles and methods can and should be implemented in

Higher Education institutions. Acn. Jens J. Dahlgaard then presented his experiences in implementing TQM in higher education with examples from The Aarhus School of Business, Aarhus, Denmark, and Aarhus Tecnical College, Aarhus, Denmark. A conclusion was that if the implementation is triggered by a requirement or necessity (the Danish Ministry of Education's requirements to Aarhus Technical College), it is much easier than if the implementation is 100 % voluntary. At the Aarhus School of Business it was shown that each department can do a lot if the king of the department (the professor) really leads the process of implementation. The case showed that the management principle of involving the employees in decision making can also be applied in education, where you may regard the students as employees participating in and responsible for their own learning process with the professors regarded as coaches. At the organizational level it is very difficult to have a breakthrough in the acceptance of TQM because leadership is often missing.





rganizational self-assessment by Acn. Tito Conti

Integrating self-assessment and improvement planning into the company planning cycle.

Self-assessment acquires a strategic value only if a prior link is established with strategic planning. This means that the kick-off of self-assessment is an activity that must be handled by top management.

Gradual Integration

Since integration of self-assessment into the planning cycle is a lengthy procedure, companies may find it best to adopt a gradual step-by-step approach.

During the first year, the aim is to integrate self-assessment into the current operating plan.

The next step – the second year – is to incorporate self-assessment into annual planning.

The third stage, self-assessment is fully integrated to strategic planning cycle.

For companies that want to be sucessful players on today's increasingly competitive markets – but also for companies that are struggling to survive – a self-diagnosis and planning system that requires the involvement of the entire company and is based on the concept of continuous improvement and driven by missions and strategic goals is now an essential tool.
